Background: Sarah is a native Seattleite, raised in various neighborhoods around the city, who has also lived in New York City and Budapest. She is deeply concerned with issues of poverty, justice, and the creation of liberating, non-hierarchical systems. Sarah is an attorney with The Public Advocate, a nonprofit law firm, where she is a general practitioner with particular interests in immigration, civil rights, and prisoners' rights. She is a certified mediator and is involved in the restorative justice movement. Before becoming a lawyer, Sarah was active in the struggle against AIDS, doing underground needle exchange, implementing some of the first street-based HIV testing in Seattle, and working closely with homeless youth to design youth-centric medical programs at the 45 th Street Clinic. Sarah also directed the University Youth Shelter. When she moved to New York City, she worked as a public defense investigator, and as a medical outreach worker for crack users who had HIV/AIDS. She was involved with the campaign for anti-overdose legislation in New York State. Sarah's proudest achievement in New York was spearheading the first needle exchange in the borough of Queens, an innovative program that is still thriving and serving thousands of drug users. Sarah holds a JD from the University of Washington School of Law, an MA in from Central European University's History Department, and a BA from City University of New York's Baccalaureate for Unique and Interdisciplinary Studies. She is also a proud alumna of Seattle Central Community College.
