ORDINANCE 125112

COUNCIL BILL 118745

AN ORDINANCE relating to grant funds from non-City sources; authorizing the Director of Seattle Public Utilities to accept specified grants and execute related agreements for and on behalf of the City; and amending Ordinance 124927, which adopted the 2016 Budget, to increase appropriations to Seattle Public Utilities.

WHEREAS, human fecal bacteria is a major source of pollution and human exposure risk in the surface waters of Seattle; and

WHEREAS, Seattle Public Utilities (SPU) has developed a technique for using autonomous water quality probes and other improvements in microbiological analysis; and

WHEREAS, SPU has been awarded two grants from King County to implement and expand the application of this new water quality investigation technique; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Director of Seattle Public Utilities is authorized to accept the following non-City funding from the grantor listed below, and to execute, deliver, and perform agreements for the purposes described below. The funds, when received, shall be deposited in the receiving fund identified below to support, or as reimbursement for, the corresponding appropriations set forth in Section 2 of this ordinance.

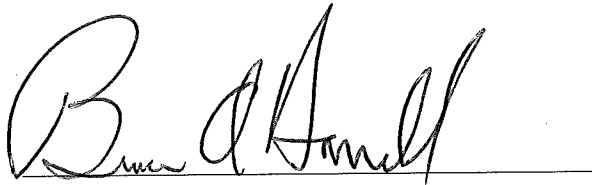

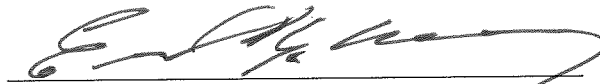

1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to grant funds from non-City sources; authorizing the Director of Seattle Public Utilities to accept specified grants and execute related agreements for and on behalf of the City; amending Ordinance 124927, which adopted the 2016 Budget, to increase appropriations to Seattle Public Utilities.

Summary and background of the Legislation: This legislation funds two grants for \$320,000 and \$240,000, which were awarded to SPU to expand and implement a SPU program to locate and eliminate sources of human sewage in surface waters inside of Seattle and in additional watersheds that drain to Seattle or are potential annexation areas to the City. A current SPU pilot project using autonomous battery powered dataloggers recording temperature and conductivity at 1-minute intervals, 24 hr/day has been successful in increasing the probability of conventional Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (IDDE) methodology to locate and eliminate sources of human sewage and reduce exposure risk to the public in streams and swimming beaches. This program benefits from cooperation and coordination with the King County Department of Natural Resources.

Revenue/Reimbursement Notes: These revenues are a combination of two grants received from King County, and are awarded for a two-year period beginning upon receipt of appropriately signed documents.

If the City does not implement the legislation, SPU will not receive the revenues from the King County Wastewater Treatment Division but would also not do this work that is directed at reducing human source bacteria in Seattle surface waters and waters adjacent to or draining into Seattle. The work covered by these grants will be in watersheds that are currently listed on the State 303(d) Water Quality Limited List for fecal coliform and pose a public health risk. Not implementing this legislation increases the possibility that the Washington State Department of Ecology imposes a Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL), which could require more costly solutions.

A current focus area of this work is in the Littlebrook Tributary to Thornton Creek. This area of the city has some of the highest immigrant and non-English speaking population in Seattle.

j) Other Issues:

The project will be conducted with both scientific, field and laboratory support from King County. Several of the watersheds scheduled for deployment are outside of the city limits, but are either in watersheds that drain into the City or in potential annexation areas (White Center). King County has supported this project with sampling and microbiological analysis and has indicated that they will continue this support.

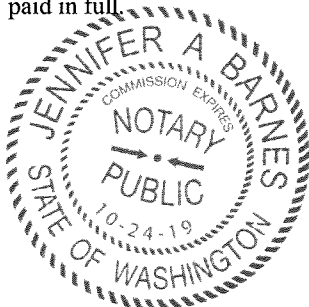

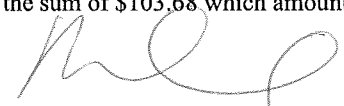

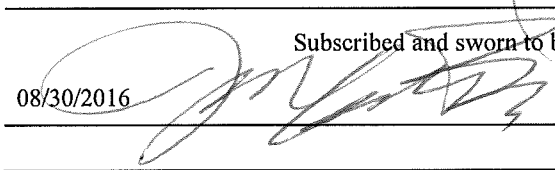
