COUNCIL BILL 119558

AN ORDINANCE relating to City streets; changing the name of the designated Festival Street portion of East Denny Way between Broadway East and 10th Avenue East to East Barbara Bailey Way; and superseding the relevant portions of Ordinance 4044, Ordinance 89910, Ordinance 102981, and any other ordinance to the extent inconsistent.

WHEREAS, Barbara Bailey was born and raised in Seattle, attending the St. Nicholas School and graduating from the University of Washington in 1965; and

WHEREAS, Barbara Bailey's commitment to service was evident from a young age, as she spent two years in Diyarbakir, Turkey as a U.S. Peace Corps volunteer before returning home to work as a caseworker in Washington State's juvenile justice system; and

WHEREAS, in 1977, Barbara Bailey opened her first bookstore in Seattle, B. Bailey Books, that would mark the beginning of her career as a successful small business owner and advocate for over 30 years; and

WHEREAS, in 1982, Barbara Bailey opened her second store, Bailey/Coy Books on Broadway Avenue, which served as a fixture of the Capitol Hill LGBTQ+ community for 25+ years, granting booklovers and authors a gathering space, and which also served as a safe and welcoming space for LGBTQ+ individuals and youth at the height LGBTQ+ persecution in our country; and

WHEREAS, Barbara Bailey was one of the founders of the Pride Foundation, which was founded in 1985 during the height of the HIV & AIDS crisis, to create a source of light and hope in a period of profound darkness; and

WHEREAS, The Pride Foundation has gone on to invest more than \$70 million in transformative community change; and

1 WHEREAS, The Pride Foundation continues to maintain a scholarship in Barbara Bailey's
2 name, intended for lesbian students in the State of Washington; and

3 WHEREAS, throughout her life, Barbara Bailey championed civil rights in Seattle for
4 communities of color, for the LGBTQ+ community, and organizations in our City and
5 across our State that are advocating for and protecting the rights of all people; and

6 WHEREAS, Barbara Bailey frequently opened up her home to host fundraisers for organizations
7 and candidates that were fighting to improve the lives of our most vulnerable
8 communities; and

9 WHEREAS, Barbara Bailey's relentless determination and strength in everything she did
10 influenced countless individuals and continues to serve as inspiration and as a model for
11 leaders in Seattle's LGBTQ+ community; and

12 WHEREAS, Barbara Bailey raised funds and community awareness for the rights and healthcare
13 for those suffering from HIV/AIDS since the beginning of the AIDS crisis, and supported
14 the creation of Bailey Boushay House, named in honor of her brother Thatcher Bailey
15 and his partner Frank Boushay, who died of AIDS in 1989; and

16 WHEREAS, Barbara Bailey worked tirelessly for the health, diversity, and vitality of Capitol
17 Hill and paved the road to office for Cal Anderson and many others through her
18 continued activism; and

19 WHEREAS, it is fitting that the street leading to Cal Anderson Park, at the site of the proposed
20 AIDS Memorial Pathway Project, and which will serve as the site for a farmer's market,
21 transit hub, and community gathering place be named for Barbara Bailey; and

22 WHEREAS, East Denny Way between Broadway East and 10th Avenue East is designated by the
23 Director of the Seattle Department of Transportation as a Festival Street; and

1 WHEREAS, City departments have reviewed this proposal and agree that no significant,
2 negative impacts would result from this proposal; NOW, THEREFORE,

3 **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:**

4 Section 1. The name of a portion of East Denny Way between Broadway East and 10th
5 Avenue East, located between Block 35 and Block 46, John H. Nagle's Second Addition, as
6 recorded in Volume 5 of Plats, page 67, is changed to East Barbara Bailey Way, superseding the
7 relevant portions of Ordinance 4044, Ordinance 89910, Ordinance 102981, and any other
8 ordinance to the extent inconsistent.

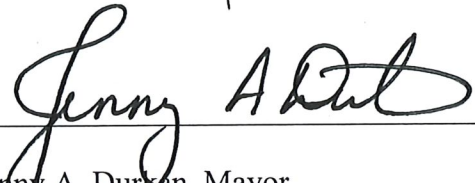
Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days after its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

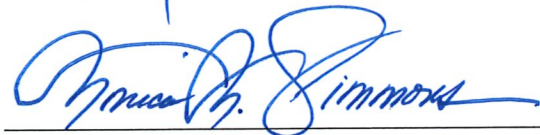

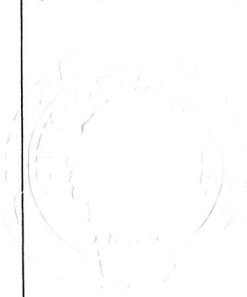

1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to City streets; changing the name of the designated Festival Street portion of East Denny Way between Broadway East and 10th Avenue East to East Barbara Bailey Way; and superseding the relevant portions of Ordinance 4044, Ordinance 89910, Ordinance 102981, and any other ordinance to the extent inconsistent.

Summary and background of the Legislation: Born and raised here, Barbara Bailey loved Seattle and poured herself into making it better. Barbara built community, forged connections and reveled in the accomplishments of others. Barbara's commitment to action made her an early pioneer for LGBTQ+ rights. Her bookstores (B. Bailey Books and Bailey/Coy Books) were nationally beloved independent book stores, and they regularly brought communities together, and hosted renowned authors. They were also safe and welcoming spaces for the LGBTQ+ community, particularly for those just coming out and during the height of anti-LGBTQ+ actions. With Barbara's passing in 2018, the City of Seattle will rename this section of street on Capitol Hill to honor her importance to the community, her lifetime of achievements and her legacy that lives on.

History

Plat:

Nagle's Second Addition

The street segment was named as "Hawthorne Street" by the original platting action.

Existing Ordinances:

1895 Ordinance 4044

An ordinance changing the names of certain streets and avenues in the City of Seattle...Section 2. That the names of Depot Street, Hawthorne Street and Decatur Street from Elliott Bay to Lake Washington, be and the same are hereby changed to Denny Way.

1899 Ordinance 5440

An ordinance relating to and providing for the improvement of Denny Way in the City of Seattle from Broadway to east end of said East Denny Way between 20th and 21st Avenues, by grading, side walking and parking the same, and providing for the payment therefor in installments and establishing a fund for such payment by the levying and collection of special assessments upon the property benefited by the improvement, and providing for the issuance of bonds as authorized by an act of the Legislature of the State of Washington, entitled: "An act relating to the internal

improvements in cities, authorizing the issuance and collection of bonds upon property benefited by local improvements and declaring an emergency, approved March 9, 1893, and under the provisions of Ordinance No. 3349, approved May 7, 1894, as amended by Ordinance No. 3340, approved July 11, 1894, and Ordinance No. 4492, approved March 5, 1897, and the city charter as now in force.

1961 Ordinance 89910

An ordinance establishing a standard system of street name designations for all City streets; changing or confirming the names of certain designated streets; and repealing all previous ordinances in conflict herewith.

Festival Street Designation:

2017 Memorandum

Approved by the Director of the Seattle Department of Transportation as a designated Festival Street.
