AN ORDINANCE relating to contracting by the Human Services Department; providing that the Seattle Human Services Department provide a cost increase when renewing or renegotiating contracts to address escalation in costs and specifying how and when to apply the increase; amending Section 20.60.102 of the Seattle Municipal Code to exempt human services contracts from the provisions of Chapter 20.60; and adding a new Section 3.20.060 to the Seattle Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, the Human Services Department connects people with resources and solutions during times of need; and

WHEREAS, the Human Services Department contracts with more than 170 community-based partners that work together to build the infrastructure to provide services that strengthen Seattle's communities and reach the vision of a just and thriving society; and

WHEREAS, partnerships with community-based organizations allow the Human Services Department to serve thousands of vulnerable neighbors every year, including providing over 1,000,000 emergency meals, supporting over 600 family caregivers and 11,000 adults receiving long-term case management, placing 400 youth in internships and providing services to over 4,000 survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and commercial sexual exploitation in 2018; and

WHEREAS, the cost of doing business in Seattle has continued to increase and the Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (issued by the Bureau of Labor Statistics) increased 24.5 percent in the last ten years; and

WHEREAS, organizations in Seattle incur increased annual expenses to sustain current services, including recruiting, training and retaining staff, rent, utilities, health care, technology, maintenance, and transportation; and

1 WHEREAS, the Human Services Department has not consistently provided inflation adjustments
2 to ensure contracted nonprofit agencies could sustain service levels to City residents; and

3 WHEREAS, in the absence of an inflation adjustment, the City's partner organizations and
4 contracted workers have struggled to provide support for its most vulnerable residents;

5 WHEREAS, the City Council strongly encourages contracted partner organizations to use annual
6 contract adjustments to provide wage increases for employees; and

7 WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes the critical role of its partner organizations in the
8 delivery of services to the residents of Seattle and expresses its intention to fund an
9 annual adjustment in both periods of economic growth and in periods of economic
10 hardship; NOW, THEREFORE,

11 **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:**

12 Section 1. A new Section 3.20.060 of the Seattle Municipal Code is added to Subchapter
13 I of Chapter 3.20 as follows:

14 **3.20.060 Inflationary increases**

15 A. The City finds that it fulfills an important duty by providing services to vulnerable
16 residents.

17 B. The City finds that human services agencies have challenges maintaining services due
18 to vacancy, turnover rates, and increasing costs.

19 C. When renewing or renegotiating contracts funded by the General Fund, other sources,
20 or a combination of the General Fund and other sources for an existing program consistent with
21 the requirements of Section 3.20.050, the funded contract amount must take into consideration
22 escalation of costs and provide for a funding increase using the measurement in subsection
23 3.20.060.D unless:

1 1. The City is solely acting as a pass-through agency for services that are not
2 provided in the city limits; or

3 2. The contract is solely supported by state Medicaid funds or funds appropriated
4 by Title XIX of the Social Security Act; or

5 3. The services are provided by a consultant as defined in Section 20.50.010; or

6 4. Explicitly prohibited by or otherwise incompatible with requirements of the
7 funding source.

8 D. For contracts renewed or renegotiated after the effective date of this ordinance and
9 through June 30, 2020, the Department shall use 100 percent of the annual average growth rate of
10 the bi-monthly Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue Area Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners
11 and Clerical Workers, termed CPI-W, during the prior 12 month period ending in April for 2019
12 as a measure of how much the costs of services have increased, For contracts renewed or
13 renegotiated after June 30, 2020, the Department shall use 100 percent of the annual average
14 growth rate of the bi-monthly CPI-W during the prior 12 month period ending in June of each
15 year. The Department shall use a minimum increase of zero percent if the index change is
16 negative.

17 E. When issuing new awards funded by the General Fund, other sources, or a
18 combination of the General Fund and other sources for an existing program consistent with the
19 requirements of Section 3.20.050, the award should be sufficient to fund an accurate and fair
20 assessment of current expenses of the human services provider, reflecting previous contracts and
21 inflationary adjustments.

22 Section 2. Section 20.60.102 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance
23 124452, is amended as follows:

20.60.102 Compliance by City officers and employees—Exceptions

No City officer or employee has authority to order or contract for Goods or Services except through, or in accordance with, provisions of this Chapter 20.60 and rules prescribed by the Director. The following are exempt from the provisions of this Chapter 20.60: ((C)) contracts for public works, contracts for consultants pursuant to ((SMC Ch.)) Chapter 20.50, contracts for human services programs pursuant to Section 3.20.050, and services for real property and property right acquisitions, claims processing, and all litigation or interests in litigation~~((are exempt from the provisions of this Chapter))~~.

Section 3. The Human Services Department shall provide a report, informed by early, robust and equitable stakeholder engagement reflecting organizational capacity, to the City Council committee with oversight of workers' rights or the Human Services Department, by March 31, 2022. The report shall address:

A. Impacts of required annual adjustments on contracted partner organizations' financial stability, employee wages, employee retention, services provided, and the City budget;

B. Evaluation of the CPI-W as a measure of changes in the costs of providing services;
and

C. Recommendations for changes, if any, to regulations requiring annual contract adjustments.

Section 4. The City Council committee will respond to recommendations in the report within 120 days of the receipt of the report. Their written responses to the recommendations should identify any:

A. Policies or legislation the committee intends to put before the City Council for approval;

B. Further information the committee would like from the Human Services Department;

1 C. Alternatives the committee would like the Human Services Department to develop;
2 and

3 D. Recommendations that the committee intends to reject or consider on a longer
4 timeline, and the reasons therefor.

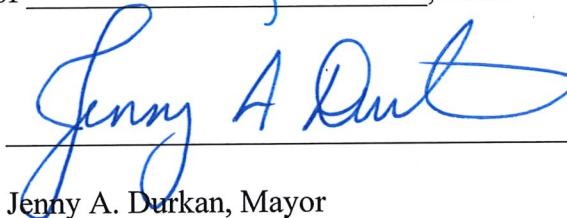

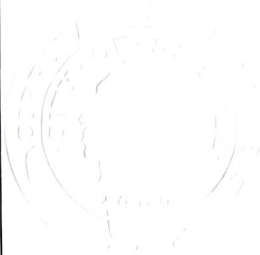

Background

At the July 15, 2019, City Council meeting, the City Council passed Council Bill 119542, as amended, relating to annual adjustments for Human Services Department contracts.

“AN ORDINANCE relating to contracting by the Human Services Department; providing that the Seattle Human Services Department provide a cost increase when renewing or renegotiating contracts to address escalation in costs and specifying how and when to apply the increase; amending Section 20.60.102 of the Seattle Municipal Code to exempt human services contracts from the provisions of Chapter 20.60; and adding a new Section 3.20.060 to the Seattle Municipal Code.”

The Bill was unanimously amended by adding two Whereas clauses at the end of the recitals:

WHEREAS, the City Council strongly encourages contracted partner organizations to use annual contract adjustments to provide wage increases for employees; and

WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes the critical role of its partner organizations in the delivery of services to the residents of Seattle and expresses its intention to fund an annual adjustment in both periods of economic growth and in periods of economic hardship; NOW, THEREFORE,

Correction

The version of the Bill signed in open session by the Council President did not include the amended language passed unanimously by the Council. The intent of the Council, as evidenced by the record and video recording of the Council proceedings, was the inclusion of the two *Whereas clauses* cited above and presented during the Council meeting. Immediately following the meeting, the signed Bill was corrected with the intent and duly recorded actions of the Council.

This memorandum documents the clerical correction made to the signed version of Council Bill 119542. This corrective measure has been reviewed with the City Attorney's Office.

Summary and background of the Legislation: This legislation requires that the Human Services Department include an annual increase to renegotiated or renewed contracts. The increase will be based on the annual change in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) issued by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Two Percent Adjustments in 2019 and 2020

The 2019 Adopted Budget included a total of \$2,597,782 for a two percent inflationary adjustment for both General Fund (GF) and non-General Fund (non-GF) HSD contracts. This included \$1,694,692 in the Mayor's proposed budget for GF contracts¹ and \$903,090 added by the Council for non-GF contracts². Due to exemptions for some contracts, the actual cost of the non-GF two percent adjustment was \$634,791, for a total cost of \$2,329,483 for the two percent adjustment in 2019.

According to CBO, in 2019 HSD is administering \$134,368,563 in contracts that would be eligible for contract adjustments, including \$102,629,020 of GF contracts and \$31,739,543 in non-GF contracts. Therefore, the actual cost of providing a further two percent adjustment in 2020 (on top of continuing to fund the 2 percent increase from 2019) would be \$2,052,580 for GF contracts and \$634,791 for non-GF contracts, for a total cost of \$2,687,371. The 2020 Endorsed Budget included \$1,928,585 for a two percent increase for GF-contracts in 2020 and does not include funding for a two percent increase for non-GF contracts. An additional \$758,786 is needed to fully fund a two percent increase in 2020. If the unspent funds from 2019 are applied to this budget item, the remaining shortfall is \$490,487.

2.9 Percent Adjustment in 2020

The most recent CPI-W for Seattle-Tacoma-Bremerton is from April 2019 and the increase in the 12-month average from April 2018 to April 2019 was 2.9 percent. The cost of providing a 2.9 percent adjustment in 2020 would be \$2,976,242 for GF contracts and \$920,447 for non-GF contracts, for a total increase of \$3,896,688. The 2020 Endorsed Budget includes \$1,928,585 for the 2020 adjustment. Therefore, if the adjustment is increased to 2.9 percent in 2020, there would be a shortfall of \$1,968,103. If the unspent funds from 2019 is applied to this budget item, the total remaining shortfall is \$1,660,286.

The nonprofit organizations that contract with HSD report that stagnating contracts amounts do not cover the rapidly increasing operating expenses in Seattle, which leads to an inability to hire, retain and train employees, pay for basic expenses like transportation, facilities and insurance. High employee turnover and position vacancies diminish the quality of service to the vulnerable residents who rely on our nonprofit partner organizations.

HSD contracted partners provide critical services to Seattle's most vulnerable residents, including low-income families, people experiencing homelessness, and survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. Many of these vulnerable populations are disproportionately persons of color relative to the population as a whole, for example:

- According to the Seattle/King County Count Us In Point-In-Time County of Persons Experiencing Homelessness "in 2019, the majority of individuals experiencing homelessness in Seattle/King County identified as people of color. When compared to the racial demographics of the county's general population, the largest disparities were observed among those identifying as Black or African American (32% in the Point-in - Time Count compared to 6% in the general King County population), Hispanic or Latino (15% compared to 10%), American Indian/Alaskan Native (10% compared to <1%)."
- According to HSD's Safety RFP, of the 11 to 17-year-old individuals with felony offenses referred to the King County Prosecuting Attorney's Office (KCPAO), 70% are Black/African American.
- According to the Washington State Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander and Black/African American households are most likely to experience food insecurity in Seattle.

Service providers report high staff turnover, difficulty retaining trained staff, and high position vacancy due to stagnant wages from non-inflated contracts. Staff turnover in the human services industry has been shown to lessening the effectiveness of services. Reducing the effectiveness of service providers disproportionately, negatively impacts people of color.

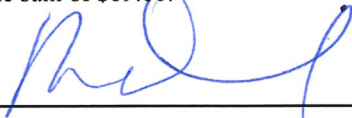

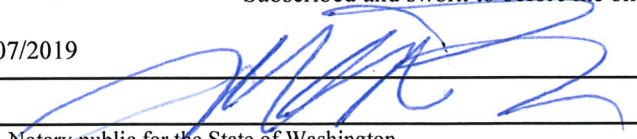
