COUNCIL BILL 119595

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Technology Matching Fund; making allocations and authorizing implementation of certain Technology Matching Fund projects in 2019; and allowing that any unspent funds from an individual project may be applied to another project that meets the goals of the Digital Equity Initiative.

WHEREAS, The City of Seattle ("City") has determined that it is important to enable digital equity, foster broadband adoption, and provide digital opportunities for all Seattle residents, including sufficient access to electronic information, technology literacy, and the application of technology for civic engagement; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 29673 established a Technology Matching Fund program for such purposes, and identified criteria and a process for project selection; and

WHEREAS, the City has appropriated \$320,000 in the 2019 Adopted Budget (Ordinance 125724) from the Information Technology Fund for the Community Technology Program to implement Technology Matching Fund projects funded by the Cable Television Franchise Fund; and

WHEREAS, the Community Technology Advisory Board has recommended projects for funding, and the Chief Technology Officer concurs with those recommendations;

NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Mayor or the Mayor's designee is hereby authorized to proceed with implementation of the following 11 projects on behalf of The City of Seattle:

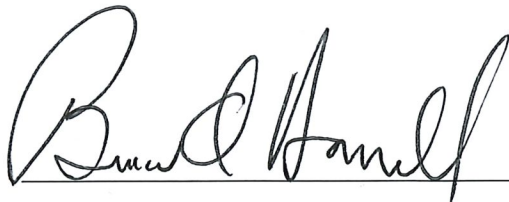

Section 3. Any unspent funds from an individual project may be applied to another project that meets the goals of the Digital Equity Initiative.

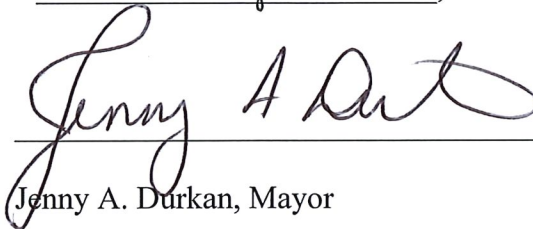

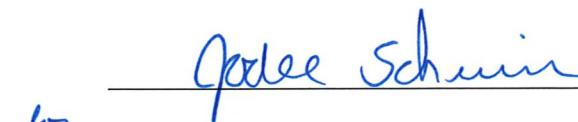

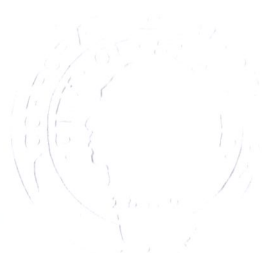

1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to the Technology Matching Fund Program; making allocations and authorizing implementation of certain Technology Matching Fund projects in 2019; and allowing that any unspent funds from an individual project may be applied to another project that serves the goals of the Digital Equity Initiative.

Summary and background of the Legislation: This legislation authorizes the disbursement of \$320,000 from Seattle Information Technology, Digital Engagement Budget Summary Level (BO-IT-D4000), Broadband & Community Technology Program, to 11 providers for the purpose of increasing residents' technology access and literacy and for increasing digital equity opportunities. The 2019 Adopted Budget (Ordinance 125724) appropriated \$320,000 from the Cable Television Franchise Fund and then from the Information Technology Fund.

The projects to be funded will assist a broad range of community-driven, collaborative solutions in achieving digital equity in Seattle. The projects will strengthen community partnerships and engage historically underserved or underrepresented communities. They will reach over 3,000 residents, serving more than 1,700 immigrants and refugees, 250 youth, 5700 seniors and 900 people with disabilities.

Resolution 29673 established the Technology Matching Fund (TMF) to provide funding in exchange for services from eligible organizations that secure matching funding from outside sources for the purpose of promoting citizen access to information technology and literacy in using technology, and to apply technology to foster civic engagement. The resolution established project eligibility and selection criteria, with the proviso that additional requirements may be established as necessary by the Chief Technology Officer (CTO), in consultation with the Community Technology Advisory Board (CTAB), to ensure projects meet the program goals and are consistent with other City contracting and financial accountability rules and regulations.

The maximum allowable award per project is \$50,000. The TMF awarded a total of \$5 million to over 300 projects between 1998 and 2018.

The City's funding to the organizations in exchange for their services will be matched by the community through cash, donations of hardware, software, supplies and labor. A one-half to one match is required; however, the community contribution is often greater than the City's support. This year's projects are projected to provide more than \$302,000 in community matching resources.

The CTO is required to submit recommendations for funding to the City Council for approval. Recommendations for funding projects are made to the CTO by CTAB. This year four current members of CTAB, one former member of CTAB, six community volunteers and four City staff served on the TMF Review Panel. A summary of the projects recommended for funding is provided in the table below.
